- **SCRIPTURE REFERENCE:** Galatians 5:16-26; Genesis 37-50
- **CONCEPT:** The Holy Spirit helps me be patient

GOALS:

- To encourage kids to engage in corporate praise and worship in the main church service through singing, the giving of tithes and offerings, and the family prayer time.
- To help kids realise that God's Holy Spirit living in us makes us more like Jesus.
- To help kids realise that God is with them, no matter where they are or what is happening, and that He can help them to patiently trust Him in spite of their circumstances.

<p>sights to see on your holiday, the best restaurants and cafes to visit, what kind of presents you can buy to take home for your family and friends.</p> <p>So, now when I have to travel on an airplane, I always read the magazine to see what I can learn. I still don't like all that waiting about in the airport and on the plane, but there's nothing I can do about that. I can't make the plane fly any faster. So, instead of tapping my fingers and asking, 'How much longer?', I read the magazine from cover to cover ... and the time seems to pass much more quickly.</p> <p>It's hard to <i>just wait</i>, isn't it? When you really want that new toy for Christmas, when you really want to go on holiday, or be a doctor or a professional footballer, or be old enough so you can learn to drive, you've got to be patient and wait ... but it's not easy, sure it isn't?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">* * *</p> <p>There is a man in the Bible whose name was Joseph. <i>Show picture of Joseph on screen.</i> Joseph was a little brother who was picked on and bullied by his big brothers and, eventually, he became the king of Egypt! But that took such a <u>long</u> time to happen – years and years. Joseph had to be extremely patient.</p> <p>2. Tell the story <i>You should have already, before the service began, set out the things you need on a small table on the platform. Make sure the baking bowl is clearly visible on the table during the story. As you tell the story, add the listed cookie ingredients to a baking bowl as directed in the right-hand column.</i></p> <p>Joseph started out as a shepherd, helping his brothers to look after his dad's sheep in Canaan. Joseph had <u>ten</u> older brothers and one little brother! But Joseph was his dad's blue eye. Joseph was his dad's favourite son. In fact, old Mister Jacob loved Joseph so much more than his other sons that he made Joseph a very fancy, colourful, decorated coat. This was far more special than anything the other boys had, and Joseph knew it. Joseph knew that his dad loved him more than his big brothers, so he used to tell his dad stories about the other boys to get them into trouble. You can imagine how the other brothers hated that!</p> <p>To annoy them even more, Joseph told his brothers about some dreams that he had had. One day he said to them, "Listen to this dream I had: We were tying up bundles of corn out in the field when, suddenly, my bundle of corn rose and stood upright, while your bundles of corn gathered round mine and bowed down to it." Joseph's brothers were mad. "Do you really believe you're more important than us? Do you plan to rule over us? Who do you think you are?" they shouted at him.</p> <p>Then Joseph had another dream. "Listen," he said, "I had another dream, and this time the sun and moon and eleven stars were bowing down to me." Even his dad got annoyed at this and said, "Do you think your mother and I and your brothers will actually come and bow down to the ground in front of you?" Joseph was 17. His big brothers had had enough. They took Joseph's fancy coat off him and threw him into a big hole in the ground while they thought about what to do with him. Soon, they came up with a plan to get rid of their brother, the dreamer. They had thought about just killing him, but they decided to make some money out of him. So, they sold him as a slave to some businessmen who were on their way across the border to Egypt. The brothers pulled Joseph up out of the hole in the ground, sold him for 20 pieces of silver, watched the businessmen chain him up behind their long line of camels, and waved a nasty goodbye to him. "Good riddance to our brother the dreamer," thought the brothers. "That's the last we'll ever see of him!"

Those bad brothers kept Joseph's fancy coat, put some blood on it from a goat, and then took it back to show their dad. Poor Mister Jacob! He cried and screamed for days. He believed that some wild animal had attacked Joseph and eaten him up ... and Joseph's brothers didn't breathe a word about what they had done.

In the meantime, Joseph walked, with chains around his hands and feet, following the long line of camels carrying the rich businessmen, for 30 days – a whole month of walking through the hot desert all the way down to Egypt. A strange country where people spoke a different language, where people built amazing houses and great pyramids, a country that didn't know God. But Joseph settled in quite well. He worked as a servant in the captain's house. God was still with Joseph, even though he was far away from home, and soon Joseph was in charge of the captain's whole house *and* his land. That's how much the captain trusted Joseph.

It didn't last too long. Somebody played a cruel trick on Joseph and he ended up in prison! But while Joseph was in prison, God was with him. The prison officer was kind to Joseph and put him in charge of the other prisoners! Joseph became quite famous while he was in prison, for people found out that he could explain the meaning of dreams.

A couple of years later, the king of Egypt – the Pharaoh – sent for Joseph. Pharaoh had been having very strange dreams and wanted to ask the young, foreign dreamer called Joseph if he might know what they meant. First of all, Pharaoh had dreamt that seven fat healthy cows came up out of the river to eat. Then seven ugly skinny cows came up out of the river and ate the fat healthy cows! In Pharaoh's next dream, he saw seven good heads of corn growing on a stalk. Then, seven more thin and withered heads of corn grew and swallowed up the seven good heads of corn. What could all this mean? No one had been able to explain it to Pharaoh. No one until Joseph heard the dreams.

Joseph told Pharaoh, "I've got good news for you and bad news. The two dreams mean the same thing. The seven fat healthy cows, and the seven good heads of corn, are seven years of good weather and plenty of food from the fields in the land of Egypt. But then, the seven ugly cows, and the seven thin and withered heads of corn, are seven years of famine – seven years of very little rain and very little food. Pharaoh, your people will have plenty to eat for the next seven years. But prepare yourself, save up some of this food and keep it safe because when these seven good years are over, there will be seven

years of the worst famine Egypt has ever seen.”

You'll never guess what happened next to our friend, Joseph. Pharaoh, the king of Egypt, decided to put Joseph in charge of the king's palace, in charge of all the king's workers, in charge of the whole country of Egypt! He was the Pharaoh's right-hand man. Nothing happened in Egypt without Joseph's say-so.

Well, just like Joseph had explained, there were seven good years in Egypt. And then, the rain stopped. The plants stopped growing. There was no food. Not just in Egypt, but in all the other countries nearby too. In Egypt, the people were prepared. Joseph had made sure that they had saved enough food from the good years so that they would have something to eat in the bad years. But outside Egypt, in Canaan, Mister Jacob, Joseph's dad, and his family were starving. Mister Jacob heard that there was food in Egypt. He sent ten of his sons to go and buy some food in Egypt and bring it home. What a surprise Joseph got when he saw his brothers wait in the queue to buy food from him, and as they bowed down on their hands and knees with their faces to the ground right in front of him, he remembered the dreams he had had many years ago – God had made him ruler over his brothers and they were bowing down to him!

Joseph knew who they were straight away, but the brothers didn't recognise him. Joseph looked different now. It had been over 20 years since they had seen each other, and Joseph now looked like an Egyptian, wearing beautiful clothes and gold chains because he was the most important man in Egypt, next to the king. He talked like an Egyptian too. He knew the language, and he spoke to his brothers in the Egyptian language so that they wouldn't recognise him. He wasn't sure if he wanted them to know who he was ... after what they had done to him all those years ago, selling him, sending him away from his family, hmm, had they changed at all? Or would they still be horrible to him?

Joseph asked the brothers some questions about their home and their family. He was excited to hear this news, but he still wasn't sure if he could trust them. Joseph was still hiding his true identity. He wouldn't tell them yet who he was. He finally agreed to sell them some food, but one of the brothers would have to stay in Egypt. The other brothers could take food back to their starving families, but then they would have to bring back the youngest brother, Benjamin. Joseph made this deal with them to test if they were telling the truth. If they brought Benjamin back to Egypt, then he would free the brother he was holding.

Simeon, one of the brothers, stayed in Egypt. The others paid for the food and made the long journey back to their dad's house in Canaan. When they got home, they told old Mister Jacob about everything that had happened: how they had bought food, how Simeon had to stay in Egypt, how they would have to go back with Benjamin to prove to the man in charge that they were telling the truth. When the brothers opened their bags to show their dad the food, they found all their money back in the bags! The money they had paid for the food was in their own bags! How could this be? “Oh no,” thought Mister Jacob, “my Joseph is dead, now those Egyptians will kill my Simeon because they think the boys have stolen the food, and now they want to take my

Benjamin, my youngest boy? No way! I can't let this happen!"

But the famine in Canaan got worse. Mister Jacob had no choice. His family needed food and the only place they could buy it from was in Egypt. He sent his boys back again with Benjamin, the youngest, and with lots of presents for the Egyptian ruler who had spoken to them before. They took honey and nuts and spices with double the amount of silver to pay for the food, and went as fast as they could, across the border, and down to Egypt.

When Benjamin and his brothers arrived in Egypt, Joseph ordered Simeon, the brother he had kept behind, to be brought out, and told his servants to prepare a great dinner for them. They still didn't realise who he was. They bowed down to Joseph and gave him the presents from their father. But Joseph still wanted to test them and find out if they were really sorry for what they had done to him so many years earlier. After the dinner, he accused them of stealing from him! He said they had stolen his money and his special silver cup! This was not true, it was simply a test, a plan to bring the men back to his house. Joseph said that he would keep Benjamin as a slave in his house as punishment for stealing the special silver cup!

The brothers cried out to Joseph! They knew that this would kill their father if Benjamin were not brought back to him. They pleaded with Joseph and begged him to let Benjamin go back to Canaan. Joseph realised that his brothers had changed. They were not like the nasty young men who had sold him all those years ago; they were different. Joseph couldn't hide any longer. His heart was full of love for his family. He sent all the Egyptians out of the room ... and then he started to cry and cry and cry. He cried so loudly that the whole house heard him. He told his brothers, "I am your brother Joseph, the one you sold into Egypt!" The brothers were silent, lost for words, amazed, terrified, shocked. Joseph told them not to worry or be angry with themselves for selling him that day because God had a reason to send him to Egypt. God had sent Joseph to Egypt so that he could save the lives of his family and many other people. He told them to go back and bring their families to live in Egypt where they would have plenty to eat.

Old Mister Jacob and the eleven brothers and all their families and animals moved to Egypt where Joseph looked after them. They lived there in peace, with plenty to eat, for many years. When old Mister Jacob died, Joseph's brothers were worried that Joseph might hate them and start being bad to them for selling him when they were young. They thought that Joseph might want to make them pay, so they asked him to forgive them and they bowed down to him like servants. But Joseph said to them, "Don't be afraid. You wanted to harm me, but God made it work out for good so that He could save the lives of all these people. So don't be afraid. I will look after you."

3. Explain

You see, there were some really good, sweet events that happened in Joseph's life (*point to the containers of sugar, butter and chocolate chips*), but there were some not-so-sweet things that happened too (*point to the salt, baking soda, raw egg*). But God mixed them all together (*continue to mix the contents of the bowl*). He was there through everything, the good and the bad. But it's not enough just to

have those things mixed together, sure it isn't? We have to wait a while longer ... we have to put the cookies into a hot oven and wait for them to bake before we get to the best part. *Address helper.* [Joan], could you take this mixture out to the kitchen, make the cookies and put them in the oven please? *Have your adult helper take the bowl out of the church.* We have to be patient, just like Joseph had to be patient and wait for God to work things out and do what He thought was best.

Adult helper

Sometimes, God wants us to wait for things. Not because He wants us to go without, but because, sometimes, He wants to give us something that will make us even happier. God *always* has a plan. He is *always* in control. So when we wait on God, there is plenty to learn ... just like all those things I can learn from the magazine when I'm on an airplane, waiting to get to my holiday destination.

Address adults: In fact, God even gives us a promise about this. *Show text on screen.*

Slide: Isaiah 40:28-31

"... those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength ..."

When we wait for God, instead of trying to make things happen in our own timing, we become stronger – emotionally, spiritually and sometimes even physically.

"They shall mount up with wings like eagles ..."

When we wait on God's timing, we learn to rise above the bitter problems of life through focusing on our relationship with Him.

"They shall run and not be weary ..."

When we wait on God, He gives us strength to handle stressful situations that come up in life. The tougher the situation, the more we need to draw on the Lord's strength.

"They shall walk and not faint."

When we wait on God's timing, we learn to cope with the daily grind; the often seemingly boring and humdrum routine of everyday life.

Maybe your life doesn't appear to have too many chocolate chips in the recipe. Or maybe you've got the chocolate chips and the sugar but you're now in the oven, sweating it out, wondering when someone's going to open the door and lift you out. Wait on the Lord. David wrote a psalm that proves to each of us the benefit of waiting ... *Show text on screen.*

Slide: Psalm 40:1-3

**I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry.
He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire;
he set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand.
He put a new song in my mouth, a hymn of praise to our God.**

<p><i>Address kids and adults:</i> David, and Joseph, waited patiently for the Lord. What about you? Is there something you would really like, but you don't have it yet? Is there something you would really like to do, but you haven't done it yet? Is there somewhere you would really like to go, but you haven't been there yet? Wait patiently. You may not be old enough yet. You may not have enough money yet. You may not have the skills or the ability yet. Don't worry! God knows about it. God has perfectly planned a time for everything to happen so we must learn to trust Him. <i>Show verse on screen.</i> "Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord."</p> <p><i>Address helper.</i> [Joan], can you please check if the cookies are ready and bring them out of the oven for us? <i>Your adult helper should leave the room and retrieve the tray of pre-made cookies you have already positioned.</i></p>	<p><i>Slide: Psalm 27:14</i></p>

<ol style="list-style-type: none">1. <i>Let's all pray:</i> Dear Lord Jesus, we thank You for being with us today on The Island. We thank You for Your Word, the Bible, and for the lessons You teach us. We thank You for the story of Joseph and how You helped him to be patient, even though it seemed that things were going from bad to worse in his life. We thank You for Your Holy Spirit who lives in us and helps us to be loving and joyful, who gives us Your peace, and who helps us to be patient in waiting for You to lead and guide us. We pray that you will be with each boy and girl as they finish school this week and keep them safe over the summer. In Jesus' name we pray. - To reinforce today's Bible concept by learning a related Scripture verse through kiwi fruit and colour games.
- To consolidate today's Bible story by making Egyptian sand pictures.

<p>F. Memory Verse 12 minutes</p> <p><i>“... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace and patience ...” (Galatians 5:22)</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Ask a few questions to recap today's story of the life of Joseph: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Today we heard the story of Joseph. Why did Joseph's brothers not like him? <i>Joseph was their dad's favourite son; their dad had given Joseph a fancy coat, colourful and decorated, far more special than anything the other boys had; Joseph told his brothers about dreams he had had – dreams where his brothers had bowed down to him.</i> - Joseph's brothers had had enough of him. They couldn't stand to live with him any longer. What did they do to him? <i>They threw him into a hole in the ground, and then decided to sell him to some businessmen who were going to Egypt. They sold Joseph for twenty pieces of silver.</i> - Even though this was a strange country, Joseph settled well in Egypt because God was with him. He was a good worker and his boss liked him ... until someone played a cruel trick on him and he ended up in prison! Even in prison, God was with Joseph. How did he manage to get out of prison? <i>People found out that Joseph could explain the meaning of dreams. Pharaoh, the king of Egypt, was having strange dreams and he called for Joseph to come to the palace to explain what the dreams meant.</i> - What were Pharaoh's strange dreams? <i>Pharaoh had dreamt that seven fat healthy cows came up out of the river to eat. Then seven ugly skinny cows came up out of the river and ate the fat healthy cows! In the next dream, he saw seven good heads of corn growing on a stalk. Then, seven more thin and withered heads of corn grew and swallowed up the seven good heads of corn.</i> - What did Pharaoh's dreams mean? <i>The seven fat healthy cows, and the seven good heads of corn, were seven years of good weather and plenty of food from the fields in the land of Egypt. But then, the seven ugly cows, and the seven thin and withered heads of corn, were seven years of famine – seven years of very little rain and very little food.</i> - Joseph told Pharaoh to make sure he saved enough food from the seven good years so that people would not starve when the years of famine hit. Pharaoh put Joseph in charge of the whole country. Joseph had become the king's right-hand man! Just like he had said, there were seven good years in Egypt before the rain stopped falling and the crops stopped growing in the fields. The famine was in Egypt and the nearby countries too. Joseph was surprised one day when his brothers arrived in Egypt to buy food. He didn't allow them to see who he was. He was dressed like an Egyptian ruler and he spoke the Egyptian language, so the brothers didn't recognise him. Joseph tested his brothers. <p><i>nasty as they had been all those years ago.</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Finally, when Joseph saw his little brother, Benjamin, he revealed to his brothers who he was. He couldn't stop crying; he was so happy to see his family again. The brothers were amazed and terrified! Was Joseph angry with them? Why not? <i>No, Joseph was not angry with his brothers. He knew that this had been God's plan for him to go to Egypt all those years ago so that he could save his family and many other people from the terrible days of famine in the land. Joseph trusted God.</i> <p>2. <i>Explain:</i> Joseph's life was a mixture of good and bad. But even when his brothers sold him as a slave, even when he ended up in an Egyptian prison, Joseph knew that God was with him. It took years and years for Joseph's story to work out. But through that time, Joseph learnt to show love to the people around him, he was full of joy when he saw his family, he had God's peace in his heart even when things were going wrong, and he learnt to be patient, waiting for God to make everything work out. Joseph knew that God was in control.</p> <p>3. <i>Explain:</i> God's Holy Spirit is with us too. We have already talked about how we can show love, how we can be joyful, how we can have peaceful hearts. Today, we have learnt that God's Holy Spirit helps us to be patient. That's what our memory verse says. <i>Show verse on screen and read aloud together:</i> "... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace and patience ..." Galatians 5:22.</p> <p>4. Repeat verse a few times together as a group, and individually, until you feel kids know it well. <i>Move to a blank screen.</i></p> <p>5. <i>Explain:</i> Over the last three weeks we have put our love strawberry, our joyful orange and our peaceful banana on the wall to remind us of this fruit of the Spirit. Today, we've been thinking about patience, and how the Holy Spirit can help us to be patient and wait. I chose a kiwi fruit to remind us of that. <i>Show kids a pre-made card kiwi fruit labelled with 'patience' that you will add to your notice board display.</i> The kiwi fruit doesn't look too nice on the outside, but if you spend some time patiently peeling off the skin then you will find delicious fruit underneath! Well-worth waiting for! <i>(As you say this, you could peel a kiwi fruit with a knife to let kids see the flesh. You may even want to take a bite to show how delicious it is!)</i></p> <p>6. <i>Explain:</i> Joseph's dad gave him a beautiful coat of many colours. Let's play a game with colours. Stand up if you have blue eyes. Everyone standing – say today's memory verse. Sit down. Stand up if you ... <i>(repeat with a few other coloured items, e.g. have blonde hair, are wearing black shoes, are wearing something red, are wearing something striped, etc.)</i></p> <p>7. Ask kids to put their mats away. Have kids stand in a circle.</p> <p>8. <i>Explain:</i> This game is called 'Kiwi Fruit Pass'. I will give the kiwi fruit to the first person in the circle, who must hold the kiwi fruit under their chin (no hands). Then you pass it to the next person in the circle without either of you using your hands. H. Conclusion

5 minutes

You'll need ...

1. Invite kids to praise God's goodness to us by singing. (**Everyday**)
2. I'm going to put my sand picture into the treasure chest. We'll take it out next week and see how much we remember about the story of Joseph.
3. *Explain:* Joseph waited patiently for the Lord. What about you? Is there something you would really like, but you don't have it yet? Is there something you would really like to do, but you haven't done it yet? Is there somewhere you would really like to go, but you haven't been there yet? The story of Joseph teaches us to wait patiently. You may not be old enough yet. You may not have enough money yet. You may not have the skills or the ability yet. Don't worry! God knows about it. God has perfectly planned a time for everything to happen so we must learn to trust Him.
4. Close in prayer.
5. Ask kids to recite the memory verse once more altogether. Allow each child to take a piece of pre-prepared kiwi fruit to remind them that the fruit of the Spirit is patience.
