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Catania Youth Reach Out

For the young adults at Catania Church of the Nazarene, Italy, reaching out to the marginalized of their city is becoming a way of life.

The group spends several days a month in ministering to the increasing homeless population, as well as to the impoverished Roma people who live in Catania.

“Jesus told me to do this”

About nine young adults from the church spend one night a month alongside other young people from their city to deliver hot meals, bread and cookies to many of the homeless people who are increasingly turning up on the streets.

The Nazarene young adult group has joined forces with Agape Mission, an interdenominational group ministering in Catania, and the total street outreach group numbers as many as 30 people.

The young people from the Nazarene church pray together, then split into two groups of four or five to distribute almost 40 meals. They talk with the people they meet, ask to pray with them, and find out what their needs are. After several hours, they return to the church to pray again for those they met.

FRENCH CHURCH ATTRACTS NEW PEOPLE WITH CHANGES

A variety of little – but highly significant – changes in recent years have helped to more than double the Montpellier Nazarene church’s attendance of French people from about 20 regular attenders to a core group of 50, plus as many as 20 to 30 additional people on any given Sunday.

For the Nazarene church in France, this progress is remarkable.

The changes in Montpellier, introduced by pastor Didier Vallee and his wife, Shannon, are what missionaries often call “contextualization.”

Didier is himself French, and pastored in the Free Methodist Church in France

before becoming Nazarene. He, better than most, understands how the French people think and what they need in a church. This perspective informed the changes at Montpellier church, which included a replaced church sign, a liturgical robe that he wears when serving communion, and his efforts to

provide academic-style theological education to the church members.

Registering as a member of the Fédération

Protestante de France (Protestant Federation of France) and et du Conseil Méthodiste Mondial (World Methodist Council) also helped to give the church credibility as a legal, government-recognized religious group.

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The changes weren't just limited to titles and memberships, though. Didier began to emphasize liturgy and ritual, as well as to begin an every-other-Thursday Bible study of a decidedly academic nature. These appealed to the French believer's need for competent authority, quiet, reflective worship and an intellectually-oriented faith.

"The rituals reassure them that their pastor is someone who has been taught... for them education is very important," Didier said. "The French start with their logic before it gets down to their heart."

A year ago, when four new couples came from another church, he had an epiphany: He shouldn't turn away people who are spiritually starving.

But it is reaching into their hearts. People are expressing a joy in their relationship with Christ and, in turn, in their lives, he said.

One elderly woman, who started attending the church in the past few years, told Didier, "I finally found my joy in my faith."

She, like some other attenders, came from another church in the city. "We've had quite a few couples coming out of [troubled churches] who have been broken by [despotic] leaders and [here] have found their stability and joy has come back," he said. "The fact that they are in a structured study of the Bible, they've found their peace again."

At first, Didier was troubled by the idea of drawing people away from other churches, even though they were finding the Nazarene church and coming on

their own initiative. He was afraid of encouraging a consumerist mentality that some call "church hopping."

A year ago, when four new couples came from another church, he had an epiphany: He shouldn't turn away people who are spiritually starving.

"When the Lord changed my view of the subject, the church just exploded. Because they found their peace, people around them have seen that and asked, 'Why? What happened? Where are you going?' And they started witnessing again to their friends because they are not ashamed of their church."

Activities have expanded to a monthly prayer meeting, which is attended by 15 to 20 people, a monthly men's breakfast and a theology class, which nine students attend for three hours at a time. The class is training new lay leaders.


One couple began attending after the husband visited the men's breakfast several times.

"The church services, always edifying and balanced between worship, liturgy, sermons on the life of the spirit, have given me back a taste for church life," said Patricia Meslem. "The silent support (is) filled with love of many at the chapel; the open Bible studies are exciting and allows one to exchange while keeping our own mind. I am peaceful in my heart to invite people because I have a passion to see people 'saved'. I need a solid church, which is a church at all times so that I can invite my friends and my neighbors."

The church building is becoming so packed that they are looking at splitting into two services this winter.

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me to do this, and it should be normal for me to do something like this," said Daniel Raciti, 21.

One time he met a man named Gianni who had recently lost a job and found himself on the street. His problems convinced Gianni that God could not exist. Raciti and his friends spent some time with Gianni, giving him a hot meal and a blanket and talking. Then they asked if they could pray with him about his situation and for a job.

"The next day he found a job," Raciti said. "At that moment he started to attend the church and he always say he gives thanks to God for [the youth] and what we do."

The man attended for a few weeks before he was hospitalized with liver problems due to chronic drinking. The youth are trying to get information on him so they can continue reaching out.

Ester Raciti, 24, met an old Polish woman

"I saw in her eyes a lot of suffering," Ester said. "She doesn't speak because she was crying."

Ester put a hand on the woman's shoulder and prayed for her, then gave her some tea and food. The woman said no one had done something like this before. Ester hasn't seen the woman since.

"It's a real good experience and I do this with all my heart and I know that I can help the people outside the church to meet God," she said.

"How much mercy He has"

Several of the Catania youth have begun to visit a settlement of Roma people, as well. Before Christmas, the group visited the community to distribute blankets and toys to the children. They also brought medicines for the women, some of whom were pregnant.

"There are too many prejudices against them," said Azzurra Caltabiano, 29, said. "Knowing them, you realize they are also God's children. I've been able to know God more and more and know much more, how much

She enjoyed playing with the children, who were pleased with the simple toys and played enthusiastically with balloons, which surprised Caltabiano because, she said, Italian children have become accustomed to complicated electronic toys.

In January, the Catania youth met with about 50 representatives from four or five evangelical and Catholic associations to discuss how they could unite in reaching the Roma people in their community.

"We want to build a kind of network, emphasize to people -- non-Christians

or different confessions -- there can be unity among us," said Giovanni Cereda, pastor of the Catania church. "Usually Catholics and evangelicals, they don't work together. We saw the beginning of a miracle. This was our first step and I think others will follow."

ITALIAN NAZARENES PRESENT HOLINESS AT INTERCONFSSIONAL CONFERENCE

In May last year, Salvatore Scognamiglio was invited to an interconfessional conference called Together for Europe, organized by a Catholic spiritual movement. At a follow-up prayer time, Scognamiglio, who pastors the Civitavecchia Church of the Nazarene in Italy, was impressed with how the participants exclusively focused their prayers to the members of the Trinity. He felt led to invite these Christian leaders to an upcoming holiness conference he was planning for Nazarenes in Civitavecchia in December 2012.

The conference on December 6 and 7, which saw about 35 people attend, included Nazarenes, Baptists, Orthodox, Catholics and other contacts in town. It focused on Wesleyan doctrine about the work of the Holy Spirit in believers called holiness.

“Our objectives are to let the local Catholics and Protestant people know that we are a Christian church and that we have a message from God that it is higher than a simple conversion or a [religious] life. This message is the sanctification of believers,” said Scognamiglio.

Giovanni Cereda, pastor of the Catania Church of the Nazarene, served as the speaker, because he had recently published his doctoral dissertation, “The Work of the Holy Spirit in the Believer’s Sanctification.” It is the first Nazarene work published in the Italian language.

For many of the Baptist and Catholic lay people and ministers, it was the first time they heard about John Wesley and the principles which he taught, according to Cereda.

“It was a good experience and a good opportunity to solve some misconceptions on the doctrine of perfection,” Cereda said. “Often when we talk about perfection, it comes in the mind of a kind of absolute perfection. We qualified that it is a perfection of love.”

Scognamiglio was thrilled with the reactions of attendees. He said a local Baptist pastor told him “this is what the Church [needs] to discover in this time.”

Cereda said he believes that the denomination’s distinctive emphasis on holiness is timely and relevant for Italians.

“There is much frustration in the life of the people about themselves and their future, and they need the possibility of a new start, and the message of John Wesley on the fullness of the Spirit and the new life that it brings. The people in our pews are really searching for this.”

RETIRED MISSIONARY JEAN DARLING PASSES AWAY

Retired Nazarene missionary P. Jean Darling passed away on Sunday, 13 January. She was 94.

Darling served as a missionary for the Church of the Nazarene in India for 40 years (1945 to 1985).

She studied nursing at Canadian Nazarene College, then midwifery in India.

“As far back as I can remember, I always thought I would go

to India as a missionary, not realizing that it would be a reality,” Darling told the Meaford, Ontario, Bethany Church of the Nazarene after her retirement.

“Spent 40 years working at the hospital. God helped me to start the nursing training school in Washim and then other missionaries came. I organized the business office, was sent to the boarding school when missionaries couldn't get out, became mission treasurer, and even director of the mission for a couple of years. One

assignment prepared me for the next, and I always stayed connected with the hospital.”

Darling was ill for some time prior to her death. She was a member of London First Church of the Nazarene in Ontario, Canada, and served as a L.I.N.K.S. missionary for the Canada Central District.

The funeral service was a private family gathering on 18 January.


